ASK an adult with you: "What objects, mementos, or keepsakes are important to you?"


Ebb + Flow Artists in Residence in Everglades (AIRIE)

Hālau Kūkulu Hawaiʻi: A Home That Builds Multitudes After Oceanic Built Environments Lab Leong Leong Architecture

A hale is a traditional Hawaiian house or building used for living, cooking, storing canoes (*wa'a*), or other social activities. This structure was built by people working together, using traditional methods of tying. **DRAW** how you would use this structure in your community.

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
